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WORLD STATISTICS DAY – Driving Change with Quality Statistics and Data for All

Statistical Office of Montenegro – MONSTAT is pleased to join the global community in celebrating World Statistics Day 2025, under the global theme “Driving Change with Quality Statistics and Data for All.”

On this occasion, MONSTAT emphasized the crucial role of reliable, accessible, and high-quality data in evidence-based decision-making, enhancing transparency, and supporting the sustainable development of Montenegro.

As part of the celebration, MONSTAT organized several activities linking official statistics with young people, educational institutions, and the academic community.

A meeting between students of the Faculty of Economics in Podgorica, the Head of the Center for Statistical Analysis, and the Director of MONSTAT was held to mark World Statistics Day. The event provided an opportunity for exchanging knowledge, ideas, and experiences. The discussion focused on the role of official statistics in analyzing economic trends, the importance of accurate and timely data for economic policymaking, and the possibilities for cooperation in supporting students' professional development.

During the meeting, Mr. Miroslav Pejović, Director of MONSTAT, stated: “We celebrate this day through a conversation with students, aiming to contribute to their education and encourage their interest in statistics, as we see in them the future of our profession. We believe that among them are future statisticians whose knowledge, energy, and curiosity will contribute to the development of statistics in Montenegro.”

Dr. Bojan Pejović, Head of the Center for Statistical Analysis at the Faculty of Economics and the University of Montenegro, added: “The reliability of data and the quality of statistical analysis are of crucial importance for understanding economic processes and form the basis for making sound business decisions and public policies.”

Students shared their views on the importance of statistics in fostering analytical thinking, evidence-based conclusions, and as a tool for better data analysis, research, and collection. The meeting also included discussions on potential future cooperation, such as organizing a School of Statistics and other activities aimed at promoting official statistics among young people.

As part of the celebration of this global day dedicated to the importance of data, MONSTAT also hosted students from the Secondary Vocational School “Vukadin Vukadinović.” The students had the opportunity to learn more about the work of the Statistical Office of Montenegro—the institution responsible for the production of official statistics and coordination of the national statistical system of Montenegro. They were introduced to data collection and processing methods in the field of agricultural and environmental statistics, and the significance of statistics in everyday life.

Through an interactive quiz and activities, students gained new insights about statistics and actively participated in discussions, while MONSTAT representatives listened to their impressions, questions, and ideas. The visit aimed to promote statistical literacy among young people, stimulate their curiosity, and help them understand the role of data in society, encouraging them to use data and engage in surveys and analytics in domains where they will work and create.

MONSTAT extends sincere thanks to the Secondary Vocational School “Vukadin Vukadinović” for this initiative and excellent cooperation, as well as to all the students who visited and made this day special.
